To: Candidates for election

No matter where we're from, we all want a safe home and a future for our kids. We care about our neighbours and we'll roll up our sleeves to help them out.

With extreme weather and devastating floods, communities are facing the consequences of decades of delay from governments and corporations. The stakes are high for all of us.

This election GetUp is campaigning for climate justice in marginal seats where communities are on the frontlines of climate disasters, and where the major parties face a voter backlash for failing to provide strong climate leadership.

Every election from here on is a climate election. Every candidate must decide if they make the floods and fires worse through their policy decisions, or if they protect people from losing their homes, towns, and their lives.

Policy decisions to support more pollution are choices to harm people. There have been enough warnings.

The good news is that a majority of voters in every electorate in the country want our government to take responsibility and take fast action, according to Australia's biggest climate poll.

This election, voters are looking for representatives who will take responsibility to protect communities from climate damage. Renewable energy is ready now, so they want to vote for people who will get on with the job.

As a movement of one million people across Australia, it is no surprise stopping climate damage consistently ranks as a top issue for GetUp members, thousands of whom live in your electorate.



We are calling for parties and candidates in the election to commit to:

- Replace burning coal and gas with 100% clean, renewable energy this decade.
- Fund the future, not public subsidies for coal, oil and gas corporations.
- Support people and communities impacted by climate damage.

Specific actions under these three headings are laid out in this Climate Leadership Pack. We are calling for fast, specific, proactive action from all parties and candidates standing for election.

GetUp members are campaigning for climate leadership this election by having conversations with voters, putting up yard signs, organising local events, and handing out how to vote cards on polling day. How to vote rankings will be based on these policies.

"We know how to deal with floods in Lismore. But this flood is different. The scale is beyond all records or memories.

Burning coal and gas is heating our planet, supercharging extreme weather. The people who are losing everything right now are the people who can't afford a house on the hill.

My neighbours and I have shown up to help each other. But the scale of this problem is huge. We can't deal with it alone.

We need a government that will urgently cut coal and gas pollution. We need to elect politicians who will represent us, not the fossil fuel industry."

WHAT'S WRONG?

Burning coal and gas is heating our planet, making floods and fires worse for people.

HOW DO WE FIX IT?

Let's replace burning coal and gas with 100% clean, renewable energy this decade.

Clean energy

- Deliver 100% clean electricity from sun, wind, and other renewable power and storage by 2030.
- Reach zero emissions by 2035.
- Reduce climate pollution by 2030 with targets that at least match major economies like the United States, the United Kingdom and the European Union.
- Deliver a national plan to clean up transport prioritising public and active transport, and replacing fossil fuel vehicles with electric vehicles.





Back affordable power

- Create energy independent communities funding a community renewable energy program and powering schools, hospitals, government offices, public and social housing, remote First Nations communities, sporting clubs, halls and libraries with affordable, clean energy by 2025.
- Roll out a national household energy upgrades program to older homes to support electrification, solar, EV chargers, batteries, better appliances, heat pumps, and insulation – so people can live comfortably in low pollution homes that are cheap to run.
- Reform the National Construction Code to make new buildings allelectric, gas-free, well insulated and designed so they are liveable, affordable to run and less polluting. And implement minimum energy efficiency standards for rental properties.

Plan for the future

- Establish a National Transition Authority to:
 coordinate economic diversification for
 communities formerly reliant on fossil fuels; ensure
 communities share in the benefits of new
 renewable energy projects; and support
 thousands of well-paid jobs in local manufacturing
 of clean infrastructure.
- Commit to no new approvals of coal, oil or gas projects.
- Join over 100 countries in the Global Methane Pledge and commit to capping and reducing methane emissions to rapidly reduce heating.
- Permanently ban shale fracking.

SOLUTIONS

According to the experts at Climateworks, we can transition our polluting economy and energy system to net zero by 2035, not 2050.

In just five years, a government with vision who invests just \$12b in home infrastructure could create \$300 billion in household savings on energy and vehicles, saving each household an incredible \$5000 per year and making a huge difference to people's lives – according to Rewiring Australia.

We can create hundreds of thousands of futureproof jobs, according to think tank Beyond Zero Emissions – and communities can share in the opportunities of action.



WHAT'S WRONG?

Politicians represent corporations, not communities, by accepting donations and handing out subsidies

HOW DO WE FIX IT?

Fund the future, not public subsidies for coal, oil and gas corporations

Don't pay polluters

- Rule out new subsidies for coal, oil and gas.
- Rule out new subsidies for carbon capture and storage (CCS) linked to coal, gas or oil projects and fossil-fuel derived hydrogen.
- Review all federal fossil fuel subsidies by the end of 2022.
- End subsidies for drilling, pipelines or infrastructure for fracking methane gas in the Beetaloo in the NT.
- Phase out all existing public funding for coal, oil and gas.
- Refuse donations from fossil fuel corporations.





Fund climate solutions

- Reform the Northern Australia Infrastructure Facility (NAIF) to explicitly ban it from investing in new fossil fuel infrastructure.
- Ensure the Clean Energy Finance Corporation (CEFC) and the Australian Renewable Energy Agency (ARENA) only fund renewable energy, and double their funding.



It's a stupid investment – leading to billions in stranded assets. And it's time to end fossil fuel subsidies and stop the expansion of oil and gas exploration.

- António Guterres, UN Secretary General Just 100 companies caused 71% of global climate pollution, including major fossil fuel corporations like Chevron and ExxonMobil. Instead of changing their business model to clean energy, they want to expand fracking, shipping and burning gas and disguise this with dodgy offsets and failed "carbon capture".

Multi-national corporations make Australia the third largest exporter of fossil fuels in the world after Saudi Arabia and Russia.

Our government's decisions are critical.



HOW DO WE FIX IT? Communities are left to clean up after land, water, and climate damage

Support people and communities impacted by climate damage

Listen to Traditional Owners

 Ensure that if Traditional Owners do not consent to gas mining projects and infrastructure on their lands, the projects will not proceed.

 Commit to a Federal Heritage Act that includes veto power for Traditional Owners to refuse consent to projects impacting cultural heritage.





Support people facing climate damage

- Invest in community-level disaster preparedness and response including permanent, funded, community resilience hubs in every local government area in vulnerable parts of the country; and prioritise funding for building resilience before a disaster strikes.
- Increase the accountability of the National Recovery and Resilience Agency and the Emergency Response Fund, so that they deliver community-led, trauma-informed, people-centred solutions commensurate with the scale of repeat climate disasters.
- Urgently implement the recommendations of the Royal Commission into National Natural Disaster Arrangements.

- Create a climate compensation fund to help communities recover from climate disasters, paid for by coal and gas exporters.
- Double Australia's current climate finance to \$3 billion over 2020-2025, and scale up Australia's contributions to global climate finance to provide a fair share by 2030.
- Fund adaptation programs for the Torres Strait Islands to support communities to adapt to climate impacts and stay on their islands.

Protect water & wildlife

- Create strong national nature protection laws that stop Australia's worsening extinction crisis, and support nature as a climate solution.
- Commit to amending the 'water trigger' under the Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999 to include protection for water sources from shale gas projects.

CASE STUDY

The Australian Conservation Foundation (ACF) says strong national nature protection laws are effective in reversing the decline of species threatened with extinction. For example, over 40 years, the United States' Endangered Species Act prevented extinction for 99 percent of species under its protection. And saw a 90 percent recovery rate in more than 100 species – including grizzly bears, humpback whales and bald eagles – throughout the United States.
